THE VOICE

Three key people of the Old Testament are given to us in today's readings: Abram, Moses and Elijah. Unfortunately most of what we know about these men is fairly sketchy. Who can blame the young children, then, who wrote down the following answers in an exam on the Old Testament?

'Moses led the Hebrews to the Red Sea, where they made unleavened bread, which is bread made without any ingredients. The Egyptians were all drowned in the dessert. Afterwards, Moses went up Mount Cyanide to get the Ten Amendments. The First was when Eve told Adam to eat the apple. The Fifth was to always humour thy father and mother.'

The Jews of Matthew's community, however, would have been able to remember by heart every detail about Abram, Moses and Elijah. These men remain the Jews' greatest heroes. The first hearers of the Transfiguration story would have immediately made all the connections between Jesus' story and Abram, Moses and Elijah's experience of God on a mountaintop, where each has a life-changing encounter with the presence of God and is illuminated in every way. Each of them is called by God to fulfil a special task and so descend from the mountain with the strength to see it through.

Matthew is especially interested in the story of Moses. One of the refrains of the entire Gospel is that Jesus is the New Moses, the fulfilment of the law and the light that illuminates the darkest night. As interesting as the similarities are between Moses on Sinai and Jesus on Tabor, the differences are even more revealing for us on our Lenten journey. Moses goes up the mountain alone, Jesus takes companions with him who share in the experience and witness to it. The face of God is hidden from Moses whereas on Tabor Jesus is given to us as the face of God for the world. On Sinai Moses receives a code of law and is told to make sure the people obey it. On Tabor Jesus receives a proclamation of God's love and we're told to listen to him. While Moses' face shines, Jesus' whole body is transfigured with light. Moses descends to enforce the law; Jesus comes down to die that we might live. Just when some of us think Lent is a grim season of self-denial, the Church gives us the story of Jesus' Transfiguration to put our sacrifices in context. The only reason we deny ourselves anything or commit ourselves to actions of service for these 40 days is to grow more deeply in love with the God who loves us into life. Penance is not meant to attack our selfesteem, it's intended to help us sort out what really matters, to cast some light in the darkness of our lives and to focus on the relationship which gives meaning and purpose for this world and the next. The God of Mount Tabor is not interested in each of us feeling isolated as we fulfil the letter of a legal code. He wants all of us to have hearts that listen to the Gospel of love so that we can gain the power to transform the world through the sacrifices of our daily lives. On a much gentler scale, Sunday Mass is meant to be a weekly mountaintop experience for us where we hear God call us by name and confess his love for us; where we feel re-energised for the commission we have to bear his light to the world. In this context anything we can do this Lent that helps remove the blocks in our full response to his love, must be worth effort.

Climate Change brings hunger to the Pacific::

A new environmental report released by Caritas shows the Pacific Islanders are facing major challenges due to climate change.

Produced by Caritas Australia in partnership with Caritas Aotearoa New Zealand and Caritas Tonga, the report shows that over the last 12 months the Pacific—a region known for an abundance of food and water—has been hit by multiple big weather events, supercharged by El Nino.

This has affected about five million people across 13 countries, leading to food and water shortages. The El Nino forced people to walk for days seeking sustenance, to rely on food with poor nutritional value and, in some cases, to become severely weakened or die from malnutrition.

More Pacific communities are losing ground to coastal erosion and coastal flooding, disrupting food gardens, cemeteries and homes. As the sea continues to rise, bringing future unknown changes, Caritas continues to hear more stories of whole communities moving because of these rising seas and stronger king tides.

For example, the main hospital of the Solomon Islands will be forced to relocate. At a cost of \$U\$100 million.

"Australia needs to honour the

promises that were made in Paris and set emission targets that are in line with limiting the rise in global temperatures to well below 1.5°C." said Caritas CEO Paul O'Callaghan.

"Countries across Oceania are among those most affected by climate change even though they have contributed minimally to its causes," Mr. O'Callaghan said. "Australia needs to contribute its fair share of funding to support vulnerable countries to adapt to climate change, over and above the existing aid budget."

Transfigured Bodysouls

One often hears the comment: 'All religions are the same. Somewhat different packaging, but really they all believe in the same things.' But do they? For example, what do they say about our final destiny? Some believe that the soul is more or less trapped in the body. The best thing would be for the soul to be freed from the body, leaving the old corpse behind and enjoying heaven simply as a soul ...forever.

Well, that might be what the ancient Greeks taught, but it is not what Christians believe. What do we believe?

The soul is not a miniscule dot of energy in some hidden core of our body. In fact, the soul is not in the body so much as the body is in the soul! There is no part of my body which is not immersed in my soul. *I* am my bodysoul.

So it is my whole person, bodysoul, which needs to be saved. As Thomas Aquinas says: 'If only my soul is saved, I am not saved.' What might this involve?

It will involve my whole person, bodysoul, being transformed, sharing in the radiance of God's Glory. There is a hint of this in old holy pictures, or the Stations of the Cross. Notice the halo of light, a golden glow, around the head of Our Lord Jesus Christ.

Today's Gospel gives more than a hint as to what we believe. This was no out-of-body experience of religious ecstasy. This was an utterly bodily experience. Jesus' body was translucent, totally radiant with Divine Light.

Note that the transfiguration was not a solitary experience for Jesus. Peter, James and John witnessed it precisely because it told them what our Heavenly Father desired as *their* destiny beyond martyrdom, if only they would 'listen to Him'. Could a person share in the transfiguration experience of Christ, exhibiting that sharing in their own bodies?

Let me recount my favourite story of

the life of a saint. (Conversation of St Seraphim on the 'End of the Christian Life' in *The Mystical Theology of the Eastern Church* by Vladimir Lossky, St Vladimir's Seminary Press, New York 1976, pp 227-229.)

A disciple of St Seraphim of Sarov recounts this story. St Seraphim is talking to him,

'Why then, my friend, do you not look me straight in the face? Look freely and without fear; the Lord is with us.'

'Encouraged by these words, I looked and was seized by holy fear. Imagine in the middle of the sun, dazzling in the brilliance of its noontide rays, the face of the man who is speaking to you. You can see the movement of his lips, the changing expression of his eyes, you can hear his voice, you can feel his hands holding you by the shoulders, but you can see neither his hands nor his body - nothing except the blaze of light which shines around, lighting up with its brilliance the snow-covered meadow, and the snowflakes which continue to fall unceasingly.'

'What do you feel?' asked Father Seraphim.

'An immeasurable well-being,' I replied.

'But what sort of well-being? What exactly?'

'I feel', I replied, 'such calm, such peace in my soul, that I can find no words to express it.'

'My friend, it is the peace our Lord spoke of when he said to his disciples: "My peace I give to you," the peace which the world cannot give; "the peace which passeth all understanding." What else do you feel?'


'Infinite joy in my heart.'
